The drought in California has caused all of us to think about water. Many students are not aware of the many ways they use water—from their homes, to their playgrounds, and to the food they eat. Recently, California Foundation for Agriculture in the Classroom partnered with California Farm Water coalition (CFCWC) to develop the 13th edition of *What's Growin' On? – Let's Look at Water*. In this educational newspaper, students will learn about the water cycle, how we get water, how we use it, and its importance to the environment and every aspect of our lives.

California Foundation for Agriculture in the Classroom has many partners who support its mission to increase awareness and

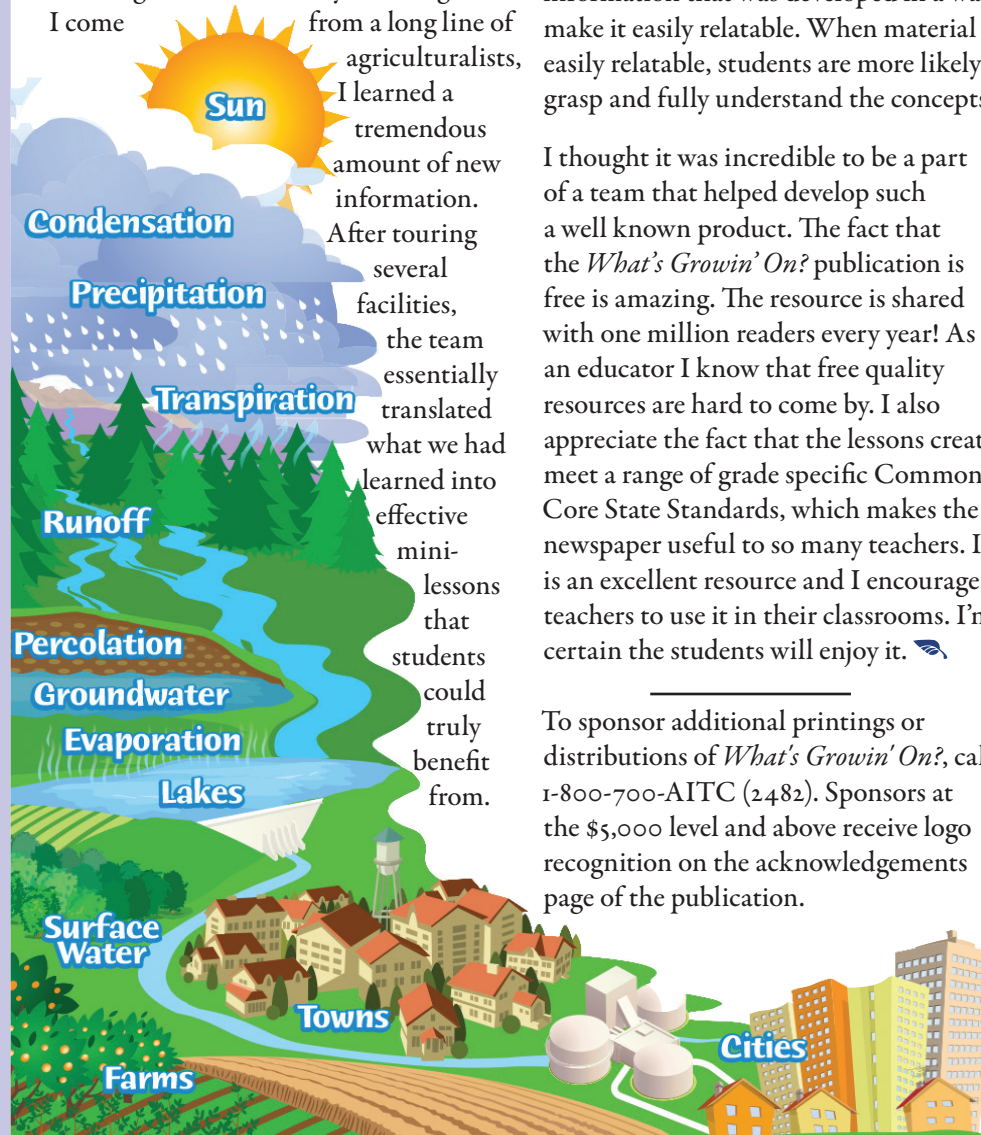
