
Why did you choose to become an educator?

Tell us about one person who has most influenced your own education and educational career.

My former boss, Wain Johnson, who was our Farm Advisor, County Director in Mariposa pushed me to attend the Farm Bureau meeting to ask for funding from Ag in the Classroom. So in 2001 I finally did and they helped with the financing of the first 3 projects; butterflies, embryology, and Root-View Gardens. It has grown to include other curriculum such as ladybugs, meal worms, Trees to Table, Farm to Fork and more.

Tell us about a golden teaching moment.

My co-workers, County Director, UC Master Gardeners, and Nutritionists have held Ag Days at four different elementary schools in the past few years. We have shared information with students about how to plant seeds, how to compost, we have provided information on honey bees, conducted a hands-on activity called pumpkin pie in a bag, shared how American Indians used pumpkins, and how to eat more fiber in ones diet. Even Resource Conservation District representatives had an activity about water sheds. The teachers and students enjoyed all of these activities.

What is your favorite AITC program/resource/event and why?

I like all of the Ag in the Classroom materials, What's Growin' On? and especially the annual conference. I have attended at least 10 conferences from which I bring home more information to share with teachers.

How do you integrate agriculture into the curriculum or activities you teach?

'Ag in the Classroom', a 4-H School Enrichment Program, is a program coordinated with school personnel with use of selected 4-H learning materials as well as some California Ag in the Classroom resources as part of the school curriculum during school hours. They involve one or more sessions with activities led by 4-H Youth Development Program staff, volunteers, and teachers.

In 2013-14, over 1,114 students at six schools, two preschools and one Headstart program were able to have a hands-on learning experience with the following projects: Honey Bee, Embryology, Butterfly Pavilions, Root-View Gardens, Ladybug Land, Praying Mantis, Composting, and more.

It has been so successful that the County Board of Supervisors and Mariposa County Farm Bureau financially support this program.

Why is it important for our students to be agriculturally literate and aware in today's

society?

Without agriculture our world would have no food, fewer clothing selections, and no trees to make our homes. Agriculture is the foundation of civilizations. Many people think that food sources just come from the grocery store and have no idea where it is actually grown, prepared, or shipped. Our youth need to know where our food is grown or where it comes from and also know how to grow it, prepare it, and to learn how much to eat of the various foods.
