How and when did you first learn of Ag in the Classroom?

I have been ordering materials for my classroom from Ag in the Classroom for a number of years, but it wasn't until I received an email for a garden grant opportunity that I realized how many more resources Ag in the Classroom offers. The resources are seemingly endless and provide much needed



materials for lessons and student engagement. I was also pleased to find additional funding sources for the classroom. Be sure to check out the Literacy for Life grant, California Agriculture in the Classroom Conference Scholarship, and Look at Agriculture . . . Organically grant! I have attended the Ag in the Classroom conference for the last two years and received the Look at Agriculture...Organically grant. I would encourage anyone interested in teaching nutrition, garden education, or agriculture to utilize this amazing non-profit foundation that supports teachers in so many ways.

How long have you been teaching students about agriculture?

This year marks my 17th year of teaching. Prior to teaching I owned and operated a Garden and Gift Shop on the north shore of Kauai. Farming has been in my family for generations, so it only made sense that teaching nutrition and agriculture be at the top of my list. I began a garden at my first school in Richmond, CA through a State of California garden grant and with the "Look at Agriculture...Organically" grant I was able to create school gardens at two additional schools. There is nothing more rewarding than watching students pull carrots out of the ground for the first time.

What is your favorite AITC program/resource/event and why?

There is no question that the California Ag in the Classroom Conference is my favorite program because it offers so much. First, you get to visit amazing agriculture spaces and places that embrace agriculture. I have been to Sacramento, Visalia, and this year I look forward to going to Palm Springs. The conference offers so many resources, such as Make 'n' Takes, breakout sessions with hands-on activities and materials to take back and begin teaching the next day. The highlight of the conference includes touring working farms or wineries and an amazing dinner hosted by companies offering a "Taste of California."

Do you have any advice for other teachers on implementing agriculture into the classroom?

My advice is to get out there. Get your hands dirty and allow students to get their hands dirty. Feeling the dirt in your hands is therapeutic and healthy for your heart, especially if you eat the vegetables, fruits and berries you grow. When planting outside, I try to time it when the rains begin so watering is not such a challenge if you have limited time. Winter crops, such as mesclun lettuce, keeps coming back when you harvest and no need to replant. It makes for an easy salad. Look for grants that are easy to write to get needed materials to get you started. All you really need is a pot with organic soil, a few seeds and a little water to bring the goodness the garden offers to your table. Ordering materials from the Ag in the Classroom website offers class sets of materials at no charge. What could be easier? Whatever you do, make sure the students experience curriculum through visual, tactile and kinesthetic modalities

and this will provide much needed differentiation. Get out there, plant, water, and watch it grow...



Literacy for Life Grants!




