1. How and when did you first learn of Ag in the Classroom?

My first experience with Ag in the Classroom was during my first year of teaching in 2016. My department chair was near retirement and was quickly passing me the mic with every opportunity. She introduced me to the



Imagine this... program and I have been a part of it ever since.

2. How does learning about agriculture impact your students?

My inner-city students not only learn about agriculture, they live agriculture. The *Imagine this...* program allows art students to see that our food comes from more than just the grocery store. Their experience at Ag Day at the Capitol in Sacramento makes it possible for them to see life and opportunity outside of the concrete walls that surrounds them at school. Watching a plant grow from from a seed brings a heightened awareness and allows the students to feel connected to something beyond their urban setting.

3. What is your favorite part of participating in the *Imagine this...* Story Writing Contest and why?

My favorite part of having my students work on the illustrations for the *Imagine this...* Story Writing Contest are the opportunities that are created for our youth to connect across neighborhoods and appreciate the agriculture industry that feeds so many people nationwide. Our students experience peace, love, unity, and safety while having fun and putting their creative talents on the front line.

4. Do you have any advice for other teachers on implementing art and agriculture into their classroom?

Students of this generation are accustomed to instant gratification. Students want to see results and they want to see them fast. Starting with a dixie cup and two sunflower seeds, my students now continue to build anything they can plant a seed in. From ceramic vessels to reclaimed wooden flower beds, our urban garden continues to grow. The students take pride in watching over it as green leaves begin to cover a small corner of the concrete patio attached to my classroom. While succulents have been the leaders in our garden, we are still working towards knowledge and education so the students can have fresh snacks as we learn how to grow fruits and veggies. Starting with a package of seeds, your students can experience a world beyond their imagination.
