1. How and when did you first learn of Ag in the Classroom?

I've been utilizing many of the resources of CFAITC since 2004 during my third year of teaching. Spending much time in the car commuting, I've become more aware of how important agriculture is in



California. I'm old enough to remember when I-680 through Fremont was lined with tulip fields for the florist industry.

2. How long have you been teaching students about agriculture?

I've made agriculture a part of my classroom, across grades 5-8, for 16 years. It's too important not to teach. How can you live in California and NOT be aware?

3. What is your favorite AITC program/resource/event and why?

The most visible event, of course, is the *Imagine this...* Story Writing Contest. I've been lucky to have several regional & state winners over the years. The writing contest gives my students a highly desirable goal - they love to win! The real win is how much they learn about California agriculture because of it.

My students really enjoy the Fact Sheets that CFAITC publishes. It gives them a great way to see what things are part of agriculture. They're always surprised about dairy and cut flowers!

The most recent program that I've introduced to my students has been the Taste and Teach program. Students, especially junior high students, LOVE to eat. The Taste and Teach program gives them an opportunity to widen their personal experience with California agriculture by enjoying favorite foods, and trying new ones, based on California grown products. They had no idea that tomatoes and apples have different tastes.

4. Describe an agriculture-based project you have been involved in lately.

A current work in progress, that I haven't revealed to students, is a school garden. I'm trying to get the various permissions I need to start a garden that the students decide on what is grown, with the hopes that we would be able to grow fruits and vegetables to be served with our school lunches or afterschool care snacks. The latest project the students have been involved in was the Taste and Teach program. Agriculture is year-round in my classroom.

5. Do you have any advice for other teachers on how to implement agriculture into their classrooms?

My best advice would be to choose something your kids are already interested in doing. I don't really start focused agriculture lessons in my classroom until I've been with my kids at least a month. My 8th graders this year were adventurous foodies, several kids cooked or baked, so I started with that. My 6th graders love to get dirty, which is why I started looking into a garden for next year when they're in 7th grade. Keep it simple, keep it personal and the kids respond.
