

How and when did you first learn about Ag in the Classroom?

I first learned about Ag in the Classroom in 2018 from Judy Culbertson, the Executive Director.

How long have you been teaching students about agriculture?

My first-year teaching was in 2008. I had just accepted my first teaching position after earning my credential at Cal Poly San



Luis Obispo. Although I did not personally grow up farming, I come from a long family line of farmers and ranchers. Learning, talking, and reading about ag was built in. It was something that felt natural to teach my students about.

California Farm Day! This was the first year I participated, and it was great! Super easy to sign up for and materials were very valuable with the information they provided my students.

Describe an agriculture-based project you have been involved in lately.

Through the Literacy for Life grant, my students had the opportunity to dive into a unit I created titled, "Where Does My Food Come From?" With my students, we worked to answer the question through a discovery and research-based approach. We performed read alouds in our virtual classroom. Three of these read alouds were also recreated and broadcasted on my Facebook channel in order to connect with more students.

In addition to the read alouds, we had two interviews and farm tours that were filmed and shown to all of the students. These were a big hit! To top it off, students were taught how to make sweet potato nachos and given supplies to make them at home too.


Do you have any advice for other teachers on how to implement agriculture into their classrooms?
