Let's start with the basics: What is your favorite California commodity?

I love the variety of dairy products from California, especially ice cream!

How and when did you first learn about Ag in the Classroom?

I heard about Ag in the Classroom during my credential program but just brought the resources into my classroom this year.

How long have you been teaching students about agriculture?

I've been teaching about agriculture in general since my first year as a teacher, during the 2019-2020 school year. At my school, we use SEAL units, Sobrato Early Academic Language. One of the units is

Farm to Fork, where we cover, among many things, how milk products get to our table, the ideal and non-ideal conditions for crops, the ecosystem of an almond orchard and fight for farm workers' rights, and land use in California.

What is your favorite AITC program, resource, or event, and why?

My favorite program is <u>Taste and Teach</u> because it provides our class an opportunity to try various foods and have different experiences with food.

Do you have any advice for other teachers on how to implement agriculture in their classrooms?

Try not to see this as something else to "fit into" the lesson plan, as I had difficulty incorporating resources at first. There is so much that can be done with the activities that Ag in the Classroom provides, such as categorizing and classifying foods, opinion writing after trying something, procedural writing, art, science, and even history.

Any ag-ha moments in your classroom? Where has agriculture come alive for your students?

We've had many of these moments, but one that stands out involves nuts. My students were doing an <u>almond taste and teach activity</u>, and they were so excited to learn that they live near almond orchards! They had passed by the trees many times without realizing what they were!
