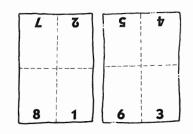
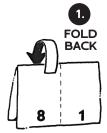
Assembling Mini Books

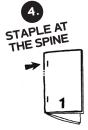
To assemble a book follow these simple instructions.



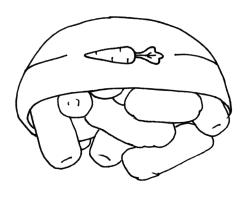




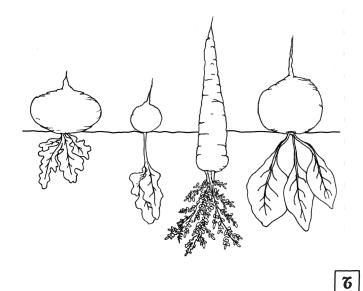

After the carrots have been growing for three to five months, they are ready for harvest. A harvesting machine loosens the dirt under the carrots and lifts the carrots by their tops. Next, it shakes the dirt off, removes the tops, and loads the carrots

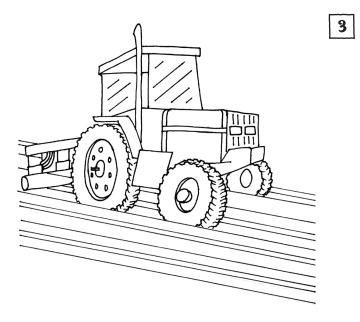


Sprinklers are set in the fields to keep the seeds damp until they begin to grow, which can take 14 to 21 days. Soon, green leaves begin to sprout from the soil. Under the soil, carrots grow larger and larger every day.





Trucks haul the carrots to a packaging plant where they are cooled, sorted, cleaned, and packaged, usually within 24 hours of harvest.



Farmers plant carrots in the field as seeds. A tractor pulls a vegetable seed planter through the field, and the machine plants the tiny seeds at a precise depth and spacing. Carrots that are grown to be sold as baby carrots are planted close together, so they grow skinny and long. Full-sized carrots are planted further apart.
