Kansas was well represented at the 2024 National Agriculture in the Classroom Conference in Salt Lake City, Utah. Six of the twelve educators that attended from Kansas received a scholarship to attend. The conference featured four days of speakers and workshops that attendees could choose from based on their grade level, subject, or interest. As many as eight workshops were happening at one time, so educators could receive a customized experience that provides professional development that is unmatched by any other event.



## **EDUCATOR IMPACT**

## Korte Warren



Korte Warren, Pre-K-5th grade teacher at Natoma Elementary School, is the 2025 Kansas Foundation for Agriculture in the Classroom (KFAC) Teacher of the Year. She worked closely with KFAC staff during the year before being submitted as the representative for Kansas at the national level in January 2025.

KFAC's Teacher of the Year award recognizes teachers who instill a passion for learning about agriculture within their students. KFAC honors one teacher annually who has successfully integrated agricultural education into their pre-existing curriculum.

Warren is in her 17th year of teaching, where she uses a project-based learning model to incorporate agriculture into science, math, reading, and writing. One of Warren's main goals is to bring real life into the classroom in any form possible. Through agricultural lessons, we can incorporate the Water Cycle and Food Web standards while showing students that they are real-world problem solvers who can and will use this information in the future. Knowing that what they learn in the classroom is in the world around them engages and excites them about their learning.


"Through exposing them to the farming and other careers available in agriculture shows them that life around agriculture is more than just planting and growing food," Warren says. "It has expanded their horizons and gives them more options to explore when finding a career path."

Warren has expanded this learning by bringing in speakers, interviewing experts, and involving several organizations to gather as many resources as possible to enhance student learning. She has incorporated growing kits into family nights and enjoyed hearing stories of students growing their plants at home.


Warren received an all-expense paid trip to the 2024 National Agriculture in the Classroom Conference in Salt Lake City, Utah, and will receive an all-expense paid trip to the 2025 Conference in Minneapolis, Minnesota, thanks to a scholarship from Kansas Farm Bureau Foundation for Agriculture. Warren will also be considered for the 2025 National Excellence in Teaching About Agriculture Award, presented by National Agriculture in the Classroom.


## Educators Reached through our free classroom kits




#### New KFAC Clickable Map


## LESSON PLAN KITS

KFAC's lesson-plan kit offers a free lesson and activity to incorporate agriculture into a class. In 2024, we sent out 2,000 K-12th grade kits to educators across Kansas, reaching 810 schools and more than 50,000 students. 80% of the teachers receiving kits were not yet connected with KFAC. This program has enhanced our ability to connect with new teachers and allowed us to reach all 105 Kansas counties, as well as get at least one kit in every school district.

We expanded our kit offerings in 2023 by adding a 6-8th grade kit and a 9-12th grade kit to our already offered K-2nd grade and 3-5th grade kits. The 6-8th grade kit uses pasteurized and ultra-high-temperature (UHT) milk to help students learn how different temperatures affect the growth of spoilage bacteria. The 9-12th grade kit teaches students about DNA and walks them through how to extract DNA from beef jerky. We are excited to offer these kits again in 2025 and are so grateful to our donors for supporting this project.

## **LEGACY REFLECTIONS ABOUT KFAC**

Kansas Foundation for Agriculture in the Classroom is an affiliate program of Kansas State University and a member organization of National Agriculture in the Classroom.







## What is agriculture literacy?

A person who understands and can communicate the source and value of agriculture as it affects our quality of life.

Much of the United States history closely ties agriculture and education. In 1981, the U.S. Department of Agriculture invited agricultural groups and educator representatives to Washington, D.C., to discuss agricultural literacy. The USDA then established Agriculture in the Classroom with the endorsement of all living former Secretaries of Agriculture, the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture, the National Conference of State Legislatures, most Governors of the States, and the major agricultural organizations and commodity groups. Since then, these partnerships have made significant progress in advancing the mission of introducing agriculture into classrooms nationwide.

Kansas Foundation for Agriculture in the Classroom was founded in 1982 as a statewide educational program Agriculture in the Classroom to help Kansas youth understand the importance of agriculture in their daily lives. In 1985, KFAC held its first summer graduate course for Kansas Teachers, marking its commitment to providing teachers with agricultural experiences, credible resources, and hands-on lesson plans. Since then, KFAC has provided resources, training, and support for educators, schools, and volunteers to spark meaningful connections between classrooms and Kansas agriculture.

> Since our founding, eight persons have served as KFAC's Executive Director. Eighteen individuals have served as the chair of the Board of Directors, which currently has 17 members, four representing the Kansas Department of Agriculture, the Kansas State Department of Education, and Kansas State University's College of Agriculture and College of Education.

In recent years, KFAC has focused on expanding its reach across Kansas, strengthening lesson plans to include Kansas Academic Standards, enhancing our lesson-plan database to include grades K-12, and reaching a new audience of educators that includes volunteers and home school teachers.
