RELATED LESSON PLANS

Magic Beans and Giant Plants (3-5)

Students will plant seeds and make considerations on which conditions affect plant growth. They will design and conduct experiments using a problem-solving process and compare and contrast to understand the parameters which influence the health and growth of living things.

Three Sisters Garden (3-5)

Students will investigate the "three sisters" crops (corn. beans, and squash) and explore the benefit to planting these crops together. Students will also learn about Native American Legends and plant growth.

How Much is Dirt Worth? (6-8)

Students will understand that topsoil is a limited resource with economic value. Activities include slicing up an apple to demonstrate the distribution of Earth's soil resources and exploring scenarios involving the dollar valuation of soil.

Gather images or flashcards of indigenous plants (corn, squash, beans, etc.). Allow students to look at these images and make observations. Encourage students to sort the crops by different characteristics – size, color, grow time, etc.
Social Studies	6.4.1.2.1 Pose questions about a topic in Minnesota history, gather a variety of primary and secondary sources related to questions, analyze sources for credibility, identify possible answers, use evidence to draw conclusions, and present supported findings.	Have students create a project surrounding the history of specialty crops in Minnesota. Students can gather sources from publications or interviews, analyze these sources, and create a presentation about their topic. Topics could be specific (Example: focusing on one crop), or general (Example: investigating crops relevant to different areas of the state.)
English Language Arts	6.9.8.8 As an individual or in collaboration, create an informative multimedia work or a piece of digital communication or contribute to an online collaboration for a specific purpose: (a) Demonstrate a developmentally appropriate understanding of copyright, attribution, principles of Fair Use, Creative Commons licenses and the effect of genre on conventions of attribution and citation. (b) Publish the work and share with an audience.	Create an advertisement for a local group that is promoting indigenous and heirloom crops. Multimedia – can be video, brochure, poster, social media post, etc.
