



## Know your fruits and veggies?

These colorful cards include clues to help players guess what fruit or veggie is featured. From familiar favorites to the new and different, these cards keep players guessing!

**How to play:** take each flash card and read the clues. Feel free to make up your own clues as well. When the correct answer is given, reveal the answer by showing the picture.

## Purple Grape

I grow in bunches.  
I grow on vines.  
I can be sweet or tart.



## Raisin

I am left in the sun to dry.  
I am the dried form of a grape.  
I am sweet and chewy.



## Blueberry

I am small and round.  
I grow on bushes.  
Part of my name rhymes with "you."



## Sugar Snap Pea

I'm really not made of sugar.  
I am plump and green.  
You can eat every part of me.



## **Spinach**

I am leafy and green.


People used to think I have more iron than I really do.  
A cartoon character eats me for strength.



## **Green Bean**

When you break me, I "snap."  
Some people call me "string."

I have a long, green pod with beans inside.



## **Cucumber**


I am long and green.  
I am white on the inside.

I am used to make pickles.



## **Celery**

I am green and crunchy.  
I grow in stalks.  
I put my stalks together to make a bunch.



## **Broccoli**

My name comes from a Latin word meaning "arm" or "branch."

I am green.  
I look like a tree.



## **Green Cabbage**

One of me is called a "head."

I am light green.  
I am great in coleslaw.



## **Artichoke**

I have many pointy green leaves.

My inside is called a "heart."

When you eat my leaves, you pull them through your teeth to get to the inside.



## **Green Apple**

I am usually more tart than my red or yellow cousins.

I grow on large trees.  
I am great in a pie.



## **Green Grape**

I grow in bunches.  
I grow on vines.  
I can be sweet or tart.



## **Green Onion**

I am green on top, white on the bottom.  
I have small, fine roots on the bottom.  
My green parts are often used as a garnish.



## **Asparagus**

I grow in long green stalks.  
I have small 'spikes' on the end of my stalks.  
If you cut the bottom off of me, I make a "spear."



## **Green Pepper**

I am shaped like a bell.  
I am mostly hollow inside, with some seeds.  
I am sweet.



## Lettuce

One of me is  
called a "head."  
I am green.

I am the start to  
a great salad.



## Red Apple

Eat one of me a  
day to "keep the  
doctor away."

I grow on large  
trees.

I am red on the  
outside, white on  
the inside.



## Red Grape

I grow in a bunch.

I grow on vines.

I can have a tiny  
seed in the middle.



## Red Potato

I am red on the  
outside and white  
on the inside.

I am usually smaller  
than other types  
of me.

I am used in soups  
or stews or just  
eaten boiled.



## **Red Onion**

I am red on the outside and white on the inside.

I have lots of layers.  
I can be sweet.



## **Strawberry**

I am bright red with some white inside.

I have a green leafy top.

I am the only fruit with seeds on the outside.



## **Red Pepper**

I am shaped like a bell.

I am mostly hollow inside, with some seeds.

I am sweet.




## **Watermelon**

I can be large or small.

My green outside is called a "rind."

I am usually red on the inside, but I can also be yellow.

I often have seeds, but can also be seedless.



## Rhubarb

I am a vegetable,  
but people use me  
as a fruit.

I am often used in  
pies and jams.

I look like red celery.



## Tomato

I'm really a fruit,  
but people use me  
like a vegetable.

I'm round and red  
with a little green  
stem.

If you fall behind,  
I can help you  
"ketchup."



## Radish

I am red on the  
outside and white  
on the inside.

I have a green stem  
and leaves.

I can taste peppery  
or spicy.



## Raspberry

I am small, bumpy  
and red.


I have a "hole" in  
the middle.

I often grow on  
thorny bushes.




## **Onion**

I have many layers.  
My outer layers feel like paper.  
I can bring tears to your eyes.



## **Potato**

Some people call me "spud."  
I am a very popular vegetable.  
I can be mashed, baked, boiled, grilled and fried.



## **Turnip**

I have a bulb that is white at the bottom and purple on top.  
I have leafy greens on top.  
Some people eat the leafy greens separately.



## **Cauliflower**

I am white and bumpy with green leaves at my base.  
My name means "cabbage flower."  
I can be eaten cooked or raw.



## Cantaloupe

I am large and round.

My outside looks like it's covered with a net.

I am orange and sweet on the inside.



## Pumpkin

I am a member of the squash family.

I can be large or small.

Everyone loves me at Halloween.



## Yellow Winter Squash

I look like a yellow and green pumpkin.

I am a member of the squash family.



## Sweet Corn

I grow on a stalk.


I have tiny seeds called "kernels."

I can be boiled, grilled or popped.



## **Yellow Potato**

I have a great tasting yellow flesh.  
One type of me is called "Yukon gold."  
I am great mashed.



## **Yellow Summer Squash**

I am a member of the squash family; zucchini is my cousin.  
I have a long neck that can have a hook on the end.  
I am yellow.



## **Rutabaga**

I grow under the dirt like a carrot.  
My skin is orange-yellow with a little purple.  
I taste like a cross between cabbage and turnips.



## **Yellow Pepper**

I am shaped like a bell.  
I am mostly hollow inside, with some seeds.  
I am sweet.



## **Yellow Apple**

I am usually softer than my red or green cousin.

I grow on large trees.

I am great as a sauce or eaten whole.



## **Carrot**

I am a favorite of rabbits everywhere.

I have a lot of vitamin A.

I am orange, with a leafy green top.
