1. Agriculture - farmers and ranchers grow and produce the crops (plants) and livestock (animals) for what we eat, wear, and use every day.

What is the process of creating yarn out of goat's mohair or sheep's wool?

Fleece will be processed, which means it will be washed and carded (combing the fibers to help strands lay in one direction).

Goats and sheep grow a healthy and strong fleece by eating nutritious forage and being limited to stressful factors. After processing, the mohair or wool is spun into yarn and packaged so it can be used to create usable items.

Goats and sheep are sheared 1-2x/year to collect the fleece (a full body clipping). After shearing, the fleece is sent to be processed.
