
There is also a section of games and activities for students in kindergarten through second grade.

Responsible for over 30 laws, NMDA's mandate has changed over the years, expanding its leadership role to address changes in population, agribusiness activities, and emerging issues.

NMDA continues to support New Mexico farmers and ranchers and other agriculturalists through marketing and promotional activities; developing and implementing federal and state policies, regulations, and legislation in making agricultural products safe; disseminating information to influence policy affecting agriculture and natural resources; and providing a voice for the agriculture industry in New Mexico.


We hope the information provided for lesson plans will assist in teaching your students about agriculture in New Mexico as well as the entire United States.
