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
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About Wisconsin Agriculture in the Classroom

Agriculture in the Classroom is a program coordinated nationally by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to help students K-12 understand the importance of agriculture. In Wisconsin, the program is coordinated by Wisconsin Farm Bureau with funding from other agricultural groups and a grant from the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.

Since the inception of Wisconsin Agriculture in the Classroom (AITC) in 1984, the program has received staffing and funding support from the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation and, since 1994, from the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Foundation. Since that time, various individual AITC projects have been funded through corporate, government support and foundation grants, with additional support for special projects from partnering agricultural organizations.

With approval of grant funding created by the 2001 Wisconsin Act 16, the program has grown significantly in scope, visibility and in the level of resources and services offered to educators and others who promote agricultural literacy.

Educator Impact

Agriculture Literacy Educator engagement led by Agriculture in the Classroom staff, volunteers, and partners reached an estimated **2,688** PK-12 educators. Wisconsin AITC hosted several statewide trainings including:

- **Seeds of Knowledge Ag Literacy Conference** hosted at Merrimac Community School offered teacher-led workshops, school forest and prairie restoration tours.
- The **Summer Book Tour** featured a day in Kewaunee County hosted by author and dairy farmer, Chase Pagel. Participants toured the farms and met the people who inspired Chase's book, "Big Farms, Little Farms."
- **Recipe for an Essay and Contest Virtual Kick-Off** offered teachers and volunteers an immersive look into the 2024 AITC Essay Contest resources, rubrics, and tips from veteran teachers. The workshop was viewed more than 280+ times.



National Agriculture in the Classroom Opportunities

26 Wisconsin educators participated in the **2025 National Agriculture in the Classroom Conference** held in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Scholarship winners, workshop presenters and award recipients represented Wisconsin throughout the three day professional development event.

Student Impact

in 2025, Wisconsin Agriculture in the Classroom staff, partner, and volunteer led agricultural literacy programming impacted over **171,866**. Programs, including grant projects, resources and presentations engaged students with agricultural lessons and experiences.

Ag in ALL Classroom“ Grant Program

20 grants totalling \$10,000 were awarded to agricultural literacy projects impacting over **3,476** students.



“FFA Food for America“ Program Support

10 Wisconsin FFA Chapters were awarded \$500 grants to support student-led agricultural literacy programs. Additional resource and lesson support of Food for America programs impacted a combined total of **54,336** students.

Accurate Agricultural Literacy Resources

Online educational materials requests and county-supported Book of the Year program orders reached **68** counties and over **47,911** students.



2025 Elementary Essay Contest

1,511 4th and 5th-grade essay contest entries were submitted for the 2025 Agriculture in the Classroom Essay Contest. Top essays were awarded in separate grade categories - allowing for grade-specific academic standards to be addressed in the contest. The 2025 essay prompt was “A Wisconsin Tree and Me: How Trees Grow Food and Fiber.”

Expedition Wisconsin Agriculture with Alice in Dairyland

3,012 elementary students participated in the Expedition Agriculture program, presented by Alice in Dairyland. The project was part of a three year Specialty Crop Block Grant. The program features sixteen Wisconsin agricultural commodities and provides information on where foods are grown and how foods are processed.



Volunteer & Program Partners

Wisconsin Agriculture in the Classroom is supported by dedicated program partners and volunteers who build strong local connections with schools, educators and community organizations. Wisconsin County Farm Bureau Agriculture in the Classroom programs, FFA chapter Food for America agricultural literacy initiatives and partner outreach efforts significantly expand the reach and scope of AITC. County Farm Bureau programs, in particular, serve as the program's "boots on the ground," playing an integral role in delivering agricultural literacy at the local level.



Wisconsin Farm Bureau Volunteer Impact

- **61** county Agriculture in the Classroom programs had approximately **66** individuals volunteer over **10,714 hours** to engage in student agricultural literacy lessons and programs.



Wisconsin FFA Member Impact

- Over **3,081** FFA members and volunteers planned and delivered lessons and programming that engaged **54,336** PK-12th grade students through the Wisconsin FFA Food for America Program.
- **33** FFA Chapter participated in the first Wisconsin AITC FFA Food for America Ag Literacy workshop in January 2025.

Book of the Year Program

51 Wisconsin County Farm Bureau Agriculture in the Classroom programs purchased and distributed **869** copies of the 2024 Book of the Year, "The Soil in Jackie's Garden." The book inspired the 2025 essay contest theme, "Dig Into Wisconsin Soil." The retail value of these resources is **\$16,502**.



Digital Impact


The digital growth and reach of the AITC program in 2025 surpassed our growth of previous years combined. The digital communication plan was aligned across all channels and focused heavily on building community, sharing high-quality lessons and resources, and consistently sharing agricultural facts and data.

Increased support from the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Foundation communications team allowed for the creation of more engaging content and trending topics, which has led to an increase in views, engagements and followers across all Wisconsin AITC social and digital platforms.

2025 New Initiatives



In fiscal year 2025, Wisconsin Agriculture in the Classroom (AITC) continued to strengthen agricultural literacy by connecting students and educators with accurate, engaging and relevant agricultural education. Through partnerships, educator leadership and volunteer support, AITC reached classrooms across Wisconsin—building understanding of agriculture's role in daily life.

2025 Program Initiatives:

Expanding Ag Literacy through STEAM and Literacy

Funded through a CHS Next Gen grant, the **Read and STEAM** initiative expanded classroom resources by pairing accurate, agriculture-focused books with inquiry-based activities and designed challenges aligned to state standards. These lessons support cross-curricular learning while encouraging student curiosity and problem-solving. Available at no cost on the Wisconsin Agriculture in the Classroom website, Read and STEAM lessons provide teachers and volunteers with a complete 45-minute lesson and hands-on activity designed to build students' knowledge of Wisconsin agriculture.



Growing Educator Community Leaders

AITC expanded its **Educator Ambassador Team**, strengthening a statewide network of teachers who champion agricultural literacy. Ambassadors supported professional development, shared classroom-tested strategies and helped fellow educators confidently integrate agriculture into their curriculum. The team established clear goals focused on increasing the relevance of agriculture as a teaching context, strengthening local county volunteer connections and delivering at least one agricultural literacy workshop to fellow educators.



2025 New Initiatives Cont'd



FFA Food for America Program Recognition and Collaboration

Wisconsin Agriculture in the Classroom partnered with Wisconsin FFA to elevate the *Food for America Award* program, promoting idea sharing and recognizing all efforts that advance agricultural literacy. Supported by a CHS Next Gen grant, AITC hosted an FFA-focused conference in Stevens Point, providing members with hands-on training in outreach, resource use and classroom presentations. All participating chapters received an agricultural literacy resource kit to support ongoing student engagement and program growth. Updates to the award program highlighted all projects that successfully met established criteria, expanding recognition beyond the “Top Ten” chapter projects.

Forty-one Wisconsin FFA chapters were recognized at the 2025 Wisconsin State FFA Convention for their outstanding participation in the program.



Expedition Wisconsin Agriculture Partnership

AITC successfully completed a three-year partnership with Alice in Dairyland, delivering an interactive classroom program aligned with social studies standards. In its final year, the project featured classroom presentations, volunteer training, and the creation of a magnetic presentation board—tools designed to enhance student engagement and learning. The grant-funded project concluded in Fall 2025, but the resources and training will continue to be used and updated, ensuring lasting impact in classrooms across Wisconsin.

The new and expanded initiatives in fiscal 2025 allowed the Wisconsin AITC program to grow and begin to build a blueprint for future resources, trainings, and partnerships.
